# The Manse, Brodick

This July I enjoyed a week on South Uist at the Ceolas Festival, a wonderful celebration of Gaelic culture, music and heritage. Like our McLellan Festival here on Arran, which each September celebrates the work of Poet and Playwright Robert McLellan as well as the Scots language and the arts, there is a church service in connection with the festival. In fact, the Ceolas week begins with worship in St Peter's Church in Daliburgh followed by registration for participants in the church hall, which is also used for many of the week's ceilidhs, including the legendary Piper's Ceilidh on the Tuesday evening.

Besides being one of the true heart lands of the Gaelic language and piping tradition, South is of course predominantly Roman Catholic. Indeed, it has been argued that it is largely thanks to the Roman Catholic Church and its priests that piping heritage survived there intact, compared to many other parts of the western isles, where after the Reformation, so many Protestant ministers put an end to what they perceived as frivolous pastimes such as music making. It is said that in Skye the local ministers made bonfires of fiddles and pipes and any other vain instruments of pleasure.

On South Uist there is also a small Church of Scotland congregation of around sixty people and during the course of my week I met with their treasurer. She explained that over the past few years they have had to close two of their buildings and now maintain only churches at Howmore and Daliburgh, with at present Sunday services alternating between them. However, as of last year they no longer have a resident minister on the island, South Uist now being linked with Barra, where the minister lives. There is uncertainty as to how they are going to continue during the winter months when due to curtailed sailings between Barra and Eriskay, it will be impossible for the minister to get over and back in order to preach on both islands on a Sunday, as she currently does in the summer months.

At this point those with a good geographical knowledge of that part of the world will be wondering why not link South Uist to either of its immediately northern neighbouring islands of Benbecula or North Uist, connected by a causeway and very much largely Protestant islands, with existing vibrant Church of Scotland congregations. The simple answer is differing theology. Whilst the Kirk folk of South Uist are fairly liberal and happy to call a female minister, North Uist is very conservative, so much so, that the Rev Dr Lindsay Schluter would not be welcome in any of the pulpits there. In fact, due to this anomaly, South and North Uist are now in different Presbyteries, South Uist having in recent years disjoined itself from the Presbytery of Uist and is now in the Presbytery of Argyll.

It was nice to hear one of the main organisers of Ceolas say that, although she herself was Roman Catholic, she hoped the Church of Scotland on the island would survive to maintain its presence. Despite that sentiment, one shared by many others I spoke to, still there lingers an underlying tension along denominational lines. especially when local couples marry across the so-called religious divide. Mixed marriage between Protestants and Roman Catholics doesn't make life any easier for those who find themselves in that situation, as I found out when I spoke to the local barman, himself a Protestant married to a Roman Catholic.

All that made me feel saddened and a little despairing, that despite the wonderful teachings of Jesus about love of neighbour. Christians, even those on such a wonderfully welcoming and friendly island as South Uist had problems in getting along with each other. Surely nothing puts people off organised religion more than such as this

It made me very glad that here on Arran, another island renowned for its warm welcome of strangers and the friendliness of its inhabitants, we have a wonderful organisation called Arran Churches Together, in which Christians from the Roman Catholic, Church of Scotland, Baptist, Scottish Episcopal and now Free Church congregations are not only happy to meet together, but to worship together several times a year as we do on Christian Unity Sunday each January, on Good Friday each Easter, at the summer songs of praise service in July and at the end of November each year, usually for a Christingle service. The fact that this year the last Thursday in November coincides with St Andrew's Day has prompted a change for 2017, and once again after a break of several years we will have a St Andrew's night service in Brodick Church, a short half an hour service, followed by a ceilidh in the church hall.

Neither are exclusively just for church people and anyone church or non-church would be most welcome to come along on Thursday 30th November at 6.30 p.m. to help us celebrate our common heritage on our national saints' day.

## **Eco Savvy**

The Eco Savvy Reuse and Reduce project was awarded funding this year from Climate Challenge Fund Scotland (CCF) The aim of our 10 month project is to reduce Arran's carbon footprint by 1000 tonnes, an ambitious but realistic target.

There are three main ways in which we hope to achieve this target;

- We said we would **save carbon by reducing car miles.** By opening our 'micro hubs' people have a reduced need to travel to our Whiting Bay shop therefore cutting car miles. We record this evidence in the form of a Carbon Data Form (CDF) People who visit our hubs fill out their name, how they travelled and why.
- We said we would **save carbon through reuse of unwanted items**. Our Hubs receive donations (small electrical items, clothing and fabric, books, toys etc) and then re-use or sell on to others, we see this as stopping things going to land fill. Every item sold or passed on is weighed, recorded and then a formula used to calculate the carbon saved.
- We said we would **save carbon through workshops**. Teaching skills like puncture repair, clothes repair or sewing on a button, are seen as 'life skills'

Our workshops are a great fun way to get together locally and pass on our skills to last a lifetime. Dates of workshops coming up include

# F.O.L.K.(Friends Of Lochranza Kirk)

Last week **Brian Miller** gave a most interesting talk to the FOLK meeting in Lochranza church.

It was about **Paschendale**, one of the bloodiest battles of the First World War. He briefly covered the reasons why Germany went to war, its primary objectives and how, having failed to achieve these, it set up for a war of attrition. Being first there, Germany chose the high ground to dig its trenches. As a consequence, the allied troops generally had to advance uphill into enemy fire, through mud and barbed wire. Water flows to the lowest point and so allied trenches were wet and muddy while the Germans remained comparatively dry. Brian read a graphic account from a soldiers letter home in which he described an advance struggling through waist deep soft mud unable to shoot back as he had to hold his rifle high above his head to keep it dry. Horror beyond imagination!

Paschendale was the idea of General Haig to straighten out a bulge in the allied lines. Brian gave other reasons, among them, Haigs ego and the desire to get a victory ahead of the French. The war cabinet were reluctant, but Haig persuaded them to agree through a brief of half truths and omissions.

The bombardment lasted 11 days, with a field gun every 6 feet firing day and night. Around 4 million tons of ordinance were shelled at the German lines. Unfortunately for the British, the Germans were dug deep and comparatively little damage was done.. When the soldiers went over the top, they were of course expected and were easy targets for the machine guns. Over 50,000 troops were killed or injured in that first day, and although some made it to the enemy lines, the Germans simply fell back to their second or third lines of defence trenches. Over the whole battle which lasted for many weeks, the British army managed to advance about 5k but failed to meet Haigs strategic objectives of securing a port and a key railway junction. Ironically, a few months later, it was decided to give up the ground gained and the army fell back to its pre battle positions. **300,000 men died** for, in practice, nothing. Paschendale will be ever linked with the names of Ypres and the Somme in terms of horror and loss and futility.

The German lines were never really breached in the war. Germany was forced to surrender through starvation and lack of necessary war material as the result of the successful allied blockade.

There was a lively question and answer section following the talk, and it was very clear that Brian well knew his subject.

A most fascinating and informative afternoon.

#### **Lochranza Loos Report**

When the public toilets in Lochranza were closed on **31 March 2017** there were many fears regarding the consequences – the public health issue, the damage to Arran's image, reputation and tourism, as well as the possible demolition of the building.

A group of local residents arranged a meeting with **North Ayrshire Council** representatives to discuss the situation and on 23 May three officials came to Lochranza. After this meeting the group decided that action should be taken to try to re-open the toilets and to preserve the building. Seven local residents formed a group, **Lochranza Loos**, and on 3 August North Ayrshire council granted a licence to the group to run the toilets on a monthly rolling contract basis.

The toilets were reopened on 4 August.

The group's aim is to provide free public access to toilet facilities in Lochranza and to preserve the toilet building, which is part of the fabric of the village, for the local community. The intention is to fund the toilets by public donation.

Since the 4th of August the toilets have been cleaned and resupplied daily by ten volunteers - Anita, David, Douglas, Ian, Jenny, Kathy, Krystyna. Margaret, Monika and Tony.

What of the future? The future is unclear. We hope that donations will cover costs but clearly we cannot be sure of this after only ten weeks. The group is aware that CMal will be refurbishing their waiting room at Lochranza Pier and will be installing

toilets there and while we are unsure as to what this might mean for the provision of year round toilet public facilities in Lochranza it may be that Lochranza toilets will still have a role to play.

Come what may, the group, which is in the process of becoming a charity, would like to see the toilet building preserved for the local community.
