Lochranza and Catacol Community Association

Since last reported in the November issue, the Lochranza and Catacol Community Association (LCCA) have met on one occasion, and that was prior to the public meeting held in the village hall on the $20^{\rm th}$ November

At the public meeting approximately 75 residents, MSP, and councillors attended. After introductory remarks, followed by a question and answer session, the LCCA were given a strong mandate to progress the community buyout of the village hotel

Without going into too much detail at this stage, a small steering group was set up and to date a significant amount of progress has been made

A number of meetings have already taken place and together with the continuing support of the hotel owner, we are hopeful that in the early part of January we will be able to inform the wider public and all supporters of this initiative what progress has been made to date

Returning to the main business of the LCCA. We are pleased that the appeal by the fish farm has again been rejected by North Ayrshire

The committee continue to lobby for economic housing in Lochranza. A number of new initiatives are currently being look at on which I will report on at a later date

While we currently have a limited winter return service from Lochranza to Claonaig/ Tarbert, the committee would like to see this winter return service as an annual fixture in the timetable

Contact has been made with Historic Scotland regarding the mess of old boats and trailers on the castle spit. The committee are hopeful that together with Historic Scotland progress can be made in this area

Due to the continuing problems surrounding covid, the committee have decided to postpone the AGM TO EARLY spring.

Happy New Year to you all! (even if it's a bit late!)

In my last charge, I was phoning an elderly lady in the parish to arrange to go and visit her. 'You can come any time except Wednesday morning', she said. 'I always have to get up early that day to tidy round before the carer comes.'

It's a bit like cutting your toenails before going to the chiropodist'

Why do we have this compulsion to put our house in order before accepting help? It is probably something to do with the pride that will not let us admit that we do not always measure up to our own or other people's expectations of us.

Like adults who suffer agonies of embarrassment rather than admit they have never learned to read, when attending a literacy class would transform their lives. Or people who are afraid to show love for fear of rejection.

There are those who draw back from becoming involved in the church and church-life, because they feel they won't 'measure up'. I remember attending a Church of Scotland Communion Service while we were on holiday on the Isle of Skye many years ago now. I was surprised that only a handful of people out of a congregation of about 30, sat at the linen covered pews at the front. Everyone else sat at the back.

When I later asked the lady who owned our rented cottage why this was, she said 'We are not 'good enough' to sit at the Lord's table.' This saddened me and I have always wondered who told them they weren't good enough, and who told the **few** that they **were** good enough!

There are also those within the church who hang back from volunteering, or getting really involved, for the same reason. There are many who are afraid to call themselves 'Christians' because they fear their lives can never match the pattern set by Jesus himself. And so we wait until we feel ready for commitment - and sometimes it can be a very long wait indeed.,,,or even too late.

We all must be ready to venture into the unknown, to become involved in changing society for the better, to go where the need is greatest and to 'rekindle the flames of love where the fire has gone cold'. Faced with the changes that are about to come in our churches this would be a good place to start. Winning people for Christ begins with reaching out to wherever people hang out. I am sure there are people of goodwill in the communities around Arran who may feel drawn to help the mission of the church.

In the life of the church, and in the life of faith, *all* are welcome, and especially *beginners*! God does not expect us to move mountains by ourselves, but he does offer us the use of his fork-lift truck!

And so, before we begin to re-arrange the dust, maybe we should just open the door and let God in - to turn our lives around.
