#### ARRAN CHURCHES TOGETHER FOODBANK

The foodbank operates from the vestibule of Brodick Church and is open 24/7. Its purpose is to provide emergency food support for those in financial crisis. The foodbank continues to be used by those needing this type of support and continues to be supported by the Arran Community by means of food and monetary donations.

#### THE WEE SHOP

Arran Churches Together latest venture has been to set up a subsidised grocery shop providing low cost items to people who are struggling to make ends meet. The shop is intended to help top up a weekly shop and stocks items such as fresh and tinned food, toiletries and household cleaning products. It has been set up in the small hall at Brodick Church and is open on Fridays from 10am – 2.30pm.

The shop opened on 12<sup>th</sup> March and will be reviewed after an 8-week trial period however as customer numbers have increased from four on week 1 to twelve on week 4, it seems there is currently a need for this service. Arran Churches Together have received grants which are being used to subsidise costs.

It operates on a booking system with only one household able to shop at a time; as the hall is small it would be difficult otherwise to adhere to social distancing and one household at a time allows for some privacy. High touch points in the hall are wiped between customer visits, hand sanitiser is provided and face masks must be worn.

# **North Arran First Responders**

As with almost every aspect of life Covid has had a serious impact on the service the First Responders can provide to the community. At the outbreak of the pandemic in March last year the Scottish Ambulance Service took the decision, due to the increased risks to our health,to stand down all Community First Responders in Scotland, so on 16th March 2020, after nearly 17 years of being on call 24/7, the North Arran Responders were stood down.

It wasn't until October that enough had been learnt about Covid to enable the First Responders to resume serving their communities in the event of medical emergencies. New protocols were introduced and training in the correct use of PPE was given, once this was completed responders could return to active duty.

At the start of the pandemic the North Arran group had 11 responders, today as I type this there are only 2 left who can book on. Understandably some of the responders, for a variety of reasons, have decided to retire from First Responding, so a huge thanks to Douglas Coulter, Richard Wright, Gordon Furzer and Mark Harwood for the time and dedication they put into the group. Of those who remain we now have a much stricter set of criteria due to the increased risks of attending to patients and as a result most are not permitted to respond just now but hope to become active again when the risks decrease sufficiently.

In terms of the impact this will have on our ability to attend to patients, obviously it is not possible for 2 people to provide 24/7 coverage, but we are doing our best and hope to have someone on call for about 90% of the time. We can still only attend medical emergencies, not falls or other traumatic events unless it is known these have been the result of a prior medical event (eg a cut head as a result of a medical collapse), please call 999 and ask for an ambulance and they will decide (if a responder is booked on) whether we should be tasked to attend the patient whilst awaiting the arrival of the ambulance. On our arrival please do not be alarmed as part of our new protocols is that we must don facemask, face visor, gloves and a plastic apron before approaching a patient.

It is hoped you won't need our services, but if you require a defibrillator and we are not on call please remember that the Public Defibrillators at the Distillery, Lochranza Ferry waiting room and Pirnmill Shop are all there for you to take if needed. Hopefully all the current responders will soon be able to return to active service and we will be able to recruit and train new responders at some point this year which will enable us to get nearer to the 24/7 service we provided before but that will take some time.

# Why is Lochranza Golf changing?

Nigel and I look back at the Hope Cup of summer 2019 as the pinnacle in Lochranza Golf's history, thanks to Pablo's greenkeeping expertise. Not long after, the course was almost entirely covered in boulders, gravel, fences and bushes.

The flood of August 2019 left significant impacts on the golf course, including drifts of gravel dumped by the flowing floodwater onto the greens and fairways. It was very difficult to clear. Lochranza Golf is situated in a flood plain, so we have to accept that flooding will happen again in these times of climate change, intense rain and possible landslides. Whilst Pablo, in our eyes, is a greenkeeper beyond compare, expecting him to deal with flood damage regularly (not to mention the usual sheep and deer impacts) then produce an immaculate golf course is simply not feasible.

Less than a thousand rounds of golf were purchased in 2019. If you do the sums you will quickly realise that golf income would certainly not cover Pablo's wages, purchase and maintenance of machinery, fuel, replacement of equipment etc We realised that it was time for change.

We decided to create an 11-hole Pitch and Putt course, open to all, that would offer shorter golf and be easier and more affordable to maintain. We will be replacing the putting green by Mrs McAllister's and creating a footpath round the circumference of the middle field of the golf course.

Our aims are for the Pitch and Putt to be enjoyed by all ages and sporting abilities, for the course to be sustainable, and to protect the stunning natural environment that we are lucky enough to occupy.

# The "Arranology" Project.

The Arranology project involves the production of three short promotional video's, each of which is around 5 minutes duration. The aim is to inspire both visitors and residents alike and entice them to visit some of the numerous sites of interest located in all four areas of the island.

The video's will be themed on the three "ologies", geology, archaeology and ecology and will be filmed by three separate film crews, two of which are from Arran, Edward O'Donnelly and Chris Atkins and one from the mainland, Douglas Simpson of "Fullcoursetrails". Each crew will be supported by local experts who wish in a few words to say what is so special about Arran. The films, which, offer a "taster", basically cover "what we have of interest" and "where it is to be found".

Some of the filming has already begun on the ecology video, taking advantage of the good weather and the fact that the Red deer, in early April, where still in possession of their antlers! The archaeologists have also been around the Island, consulting with the Heritage museum and other local experts, whilst the geologists have written scripts and earmarked various sites of note, ready for filming from now until early May.

The whole project is due to finish by mid- June when it is hoped that we will have managed to create three videos which can be downloaded or streamed free of charge from the Arran Geopark website or viewed at the various visitor interpretation centres located around the island.

It should also be noted that without the financial support and backing from The Arran Trust, Highlands & Islands Enterprise, Arran Access Trust, together with local voluntary input from staff representing the National Trust for Scotland, Coast, Eco-Savy, Arran Heritage Museum, Lochranza Centre cic , Lucy Wallace, Otterstail, Visit Arran together with a great many other individuals, this project would not have got off the ground.

At a time of difficulty for many, it is nice to have a collaborative project to work on which hopefully will bring interest and pleasure to participants and viewers alike.

# Postings from Pirnmill Village Association (PVA)

Our community is great isn't it. A friendly wave when out for a walk or a cheery chat across the garden, at distance of course... such simple gestures but what a huge difference they make in these difficult times.

So much has happened since our Church Magazine was last published...

Pirnmill Village Association officially became a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) in August last year and we are very thankful to Pirnmill residents for showing their support for our new structure. With a whopping 64 uptake in membership, we are delighted to have received such great support.

Our over 60s Christmas Dinner was a little different in 2020 but thanks to Val and Rino at Stag's Pavillion and the volunteers who assisted in delivering, our VIPs had a wonderful take-out alternative which they very much appreciated and enjoyed.

Lots of work behind the scenes planning for the future of our Community Centre, which is in dire need of refurbishing. Work is on-going with North Ayrshire Council for a 10-year lease whilst also working towards ownership of our Community Centre for the long-term benefit of our community, via the Community Asset Transfer process. We are taking advice from Community Ownership Support Services (about the asset transfer) and from Zero Waste Scotland (about energy efficiency), all of which is available without cost to the Association. We are also in discussion with 2 major grant-funding bodies, working hard to be ready for any pre-conditions for applications. We want to thank those who participated in our Community Consultation as part of this process, we received a lot of support and many wonderful ideas.

Like many other villages across Arran, we have been experiencing issues with dogowners not clearing up after their pets. As a result, free NAC poo bags are now stocked in the village shop. We will also be installing additional red dog poo bins and signage in the village in the coming weeks. We would like to thank all of our careful dog owners for their extra vigilance, following recent communications.

Plans are also well underway for Pirnmill to become the next village to join the popular community farm initiative, the Pioneer Project. The project is very much dependent on volunteers, so if this is something that interests you please do get in touch and register your interest at arran@pioneerproject.

# AN EXTRACT FROM THE CHURCH NEWSLETTER.....December 1976! BY THE REV. J. DOW

No doubt many of our friends who live furth of the island would be thinking of us at the beginning of the month and saying to themselves, "Arran must be looking lovely just now with the snow on the hills. It must be like a Christmas card"

And so, indeed it is....seen through glass. There the resemblance ends, however. Most of us are sitting with our feet as far up the chimney as they will go, and whispering, 'If Winter comes, can Spring be far behind?" As Bud Neil would have put it: "Winter has came, an' it's murder I'nt it?"

We seem to be in the mood for quotations this morning, and the mind turns to Shakespeare, "and to milk coming frozen home in pail, and Dick the shepherd blowing his nail". No reference is really intended to Tom Logan and John Hendry.

The villages have been, as might be expected, quiet in these latter days. But there is one death to be recorded, that of Mrs MacLeod widow of Alex MacLeod of Pirnmill who for many years acted as precentor in the Free Kirk. Some little time after his death she went to Montrose House, but died suddenly in the War memorial Hospital. We assure the family of our sympathy in their loss, for she was one held in high esteem and for whom the village had much affection.

It's quite a while since we had a wedding in the parish: this month there will be two. Eileen McAllister will be married to Stewart Dickie, and Flo MacAllister will be married to lan Scott a Doctor in Canada and will be going out there with Mhari and Kinnon. I'm sure I speak for all of you when I wish them all well.

On the last Sunday of November we had the usual exchange of pulpits round the island, and we had lan MacLeod of Brodick and Corrie with us, though he is not really a stranger to Pirnmill at any rate, since his wife taught there for some time. I was unlucky in the draw and had to journey to Kilmory. It was a cold day and their boiler seemed to have a wee touch of pneumonia.

I thought I would have to go over to the mainland on the 9<sup>th</sup> to do recordings for STV's "Late Call" and I wasn't greatly looking forward to it. The date has been changed to the 17<sup>th</sup> January and I'll be Late Calling during Burns Week, if anybody's interested. I don't suppose I'll be away again till mid-February when Margaret and I are going South to see the Sassenach half of the family. I'll just be the one Sunday off.

Two who will be departing from our midst in the New Year, and whom we're very sorry to see go are John and Mrs Stewart. But they're only going as far as Lamlash, so that they're not leaving us altogether.

Two who are desperately anxious to get back to us again are Jackie and Babs Hunter. I should have said three, for Nigel is probably even more desperate to get back. But they

can't move from Kent for about eighteen months yet: till Simon's finished school. So if anybody knows of a house that will be up for sale about then, the Hunters would be glad to hear about it.

The Communion Services were well attended, and we find the roll gradually growing again as new folk come in: the Mars, and the Cants, and the Smiths and the Whiteheads and the Busbys and the Patersons and one or two others who haven't found there way along to the church yet, but will no doubt do so in the fullness of time. It's very satisfactory.

Last month I mentioned the lamps and the stained glass window of the Free Kirk, and invited any who are interested to make some contribution towards the cost, which in the end of the day will be guite considerable.

We now have the lamps though they won't be hung till they're thoroughly cleaned, and we're still waiting for a stained glass window expert to come down and give us advice and an estimate of cost before we do anything about the window.

And now all that remains to be done is for me, on behalf of the congregation to wish all are far flung friends the traditional compliments of the season. And this is done, not because these compliments are traditional but because they are real, meaningful and sincere. We'd find it very hard, if not impossible, to get on without you.
