'Six days shalt thou labour and do all thy work: but the seventh day is the sabbath of the Lord thy God; in it thou shalt not do any work' (Exodus 20: 8-9).

So runs the fourth commandment, one I always tried very hard to keep all my working life, that is, until I became a minister. Now Sunday, albeit my favourite day of the week still, when I joy to lead worship three times, is not exactly a day of rest. So when does the minister take his one day off a week?

I once had a discussion on this topic with the late Douglas Fulton, minister at Kilmory and Lamlash and he rather humorously pointed out, that if he was seen out in his garden on a weekday when the members of his congregation were engaged in their daily toil, instead of out and about ministering in his parish, or in his study – 'all right for some' – was considered lazy, but if he worked all the days of the week and in the process neglected his garden, was considered even lazier still!

Compounding the problem is the fear, that being responsible 24/7 for the well fare of every soul in the parish, or in our case 5 parishes, if a day is taken off someone might be left uncared for at a time of need.

Perhaps for that reason in the previous ten years, apart from annual leave I have neglected to take a regular day off at all, and even then the phone is still checked several times daily. In the process, I have neglected both my family and my health. All work and no play makes Angus a very dull boy indeed! Jean too, despite being contracted and paid to work only 33 and a half hours a week, finds herself in a similar situation.

However, in our position, there really is no need for this to be the case. There are two of us on the ground. Always, if one is on holiday, the other covers. At such times, apart from having to conduct a funeral on the mainland, or be away engaged in Presbytery business elsewhere, one of us is on hand at any given time.

An extract from "West Side Story' The Parish Magazine of Lochranza & Pirnmill linked with Shiskine Church of Scotland – July 1991

The Weir Family Connections with the Isle of Arran

My knowledge of our family's association with Arran goes back to the end of the last century.

I believe our connection dates from a much earlier period but the history has been lost with the passing of time. It was in the early 1890s that my grandfather Robert McNair Weir and his brother Andrew Sillars Weir used to spend their holidays working at Drumadee Farm. During that time they would stay with their Aunt, Jean Sillars at Machrie.

In later years, Robert and Andrew, with their respective families returned to Arran regularly and continued to stay with Jean, who had by this time moved to 'The Craggs' at Catacol. After Jean's death the family spent their holidays in Lochranza. Amongst the houses they rented were 'Mount View', the 'Wee Free Manse' and 'Kincardine'.

The visits to Arran ceased in 1938 after the death of Robert's son, my namesake Colin, who was killed whilst climbing Caisteal Abhail, at the age of 15. *

The family did not return to Arran until 1947 and over the next few years stayed in most of the houses in the village.

In the early fifties my Grandfather purchased 'Kincardine' and the house remained in the family until about 6 years after his death in 1966. Most of my earliest memories are of holidays at 'Kincardine', halcyon days spent messing about in boats, fishing, walking and in later years going to the Lochranza Dances.

I introduced my wife to Arran in 1964 and it was hoped that we would get married in Lochranza, but due to family commitments this was not possible. We did, however, return for our honeymoon as my Grandfather had done some 54 years earlier.

My wife and I have visited Arran as often as 3 times a year since then and we were delighted when, in March of this year. Rev Ian MacLeod representing Rev Andrew Barrie, agreed to conduct a short service in celebration of our 25th Wedding Anniversary. Old friends made us very welcome and laid on a splendid party for the occasion.

We hope to be able to return to Arran and enjoy its hospitality for many years to come.

South American Adventure (Part 1)

"The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world and all who live in it, for he founded it upon the seas and established it upon the waters".

For those of you who have travelled, you will know how vast God's earth is.

In February I travelled to **South America** with **Elizabeth Watson**. After the journey to **Buenos Aires** in Argentina via **London** then **Paris**, we boarded the cruise ship **Zaandam** in Buenos Aires harbour. As this was my first time on a cruise ship I didnt know what to expect, except what others had told me. However I have to say that I wasnt disappointed. To me the ship was huge and I was told it was a medium sized one. The whole cruise was an amazing adventure though, one I mistakingly thought I could only dream of.

In the evening we went on a tour to one of the most iconic tango theatres in **Buenos Aires** for a spectacular presentation of the acclaimed, popular dance. Professionals took us on a journey through the ages of Argentina's most celebrated dance. I for one was glad they didnt ask the audience to join in.

The first night was spent on the ship in the harbour then next day we took a 'Panoramic Highlights tour of Buenos Aires'. We began by visiting **San Telmo** and **La Boca** two lively and colourful areas. As Argentinians are passionate about their football we were taken by a stadium, the home of their most famous football team, Boca Juniors. As my grandsons are football fanatics too I had to get them football tops.

We then travelled along the citys widest Boulevard, **9 de Julio** (9th July Avenue). It was called after the date they gained their independence. It is the widest Avenue in South America. We passed by the **Presidential Palace** or Pink Palace (called that because of its pink colour) where **Eva Peron** one of their history's most famous women gave a speech from the balcony there. Another place we passed was a garden area where a clock made in the image of London's Big Ben stood. The clock was gifted by the U.K. but its name was changed after the **Falklands War** and is not now spoken about except by tour guides.

At night we sailed down the **River Plate** to find ourselves waking up in the morning in **Montevideo harbour**, **Uruguay**. Our shore Excursion this day was the 'Montevideo Highlights and Uruguayan Carnival'. There was a tour of the city sights and then to a **Carnival Museum**. Carnival in South America is primarily associated with **Rio de Janeiro**, but Uruguay the second smallest country of South America, celebrates the longest Carnival competition in the world. At the museum we learned that Carnival in Uruguay is a mix of European and African traditions. We saw displays of colourful costumes and were treated to a display of **Candombe** and **Murga**.

Lochranza & Catacol Community Association Report

The committee were delighted to see so many at the recent public meeting and very much welcomed the many helpful contributions on the various topics discussed. It is very reassuring to get such great feedback and it is refreshing to know that our efforts are appreciated. As was said at the meeting, we are always on the lookout for new committee members so please don't be shy about putting yourself forward. We need your help so why not let us know you are prepared to contribute. Sadly so few are these days, so why not give something back to the community you live in and are part of, so we can work together to secure the future well being of Lochranza and Catacol.

Many important issues were discussed at the meeting. The Lyme disease survey had been extremely successful with a high response rate. It confirmed a high incidence of Lyme disease in the area and this will be pursued with the Health Department in Edinburgh after the election. Camper vans were discussed at some length and in particular the impact they were having on the island. While most welcomed the benefits to tourism and local business it was thought that NAC should have some overall management strategy. This should include policies on overnight parking, wild camping, waste disposal, road safety, and overflow parking when sites full. The committee agreed to raise this issue with both NAC and the Community Council. Also of concern is a lack of volunteers on the island for the fire service, the lifeboats, first responders, and coastguard. This matter also to be raised with councils. Other issues discussed were beach and foreshore clean (details to follow) impact of forestry and roads, ferry issues and the potential closure of public toilets. With **Candombe drummers** and dancers played and danced to a drum-based rhythm which originated from **Angola and the Congo**. Murga was a mixture of song, theatre and comedy and had its origins in **Cadiz in Spain**. Some of our group were asked to join in and so they did, dressing up and dancing round the tables. You will be glad to know I wasn't one of the volunteers.

After leaving **Montevideo** we spent the next two days at sea, enjoying the cruise and relaxing in the sunshine.

On **Friday 26th February** the ship arrived at the **Falkland Islands**. The ship anchored out in the Bay and we had to get into a small tender for the journey into **Port Stanley**. On the way there some folk saw the dolphins jumping out of the water but I managed to miss them. On shore we got into a coach for our tour of Stanley which is home to more than 80% of the entire population of the Falkland Islands. It was quite a moving experience being in that place. It wasn't raining but was quite cold and damp. It reminded me of Mull although without the high hills and the forests.

There are some hills there though and the guide told us that was where some of the battles were fought during the war with **Argentina in 1982** like on **Mount Tumbledown**. We drove past the memorial from that war with many names on it and then outside Stanley past the local airport and Surf Bay to see the beach and minefields from that time. There are still unexploded bombs there today. A drive past **Government House** was next. Building work began on the house in **1845** but it was **1859** before the first Governor took up residence. A visit to the Falkland Islands Museum was very interesting with its history and exhibits before travelling along the road to the **Anglican Cathedral** the southermost Cathedral in the world, featuring an arch constructed from the jawbones of two blue whales. A visit to the souveneir shop was a must, however I didn't get time to send postcards before getting back on to the tender to get back to the ship. On looking back at Port Stanley I had to pinch myself to believe that I had been there in the Falkland Islands but I have the photos to look at and prove I was there.

On leaving the islands we sailed on towards the **Magellan Straits** a natural passage between the **Atlantic and Pacific oceans** and to more wonderful places to view more of the beauty of God's creation.

Community Garden Report 12th June 2006

Firstly – a few thanks!

To Jim Jack for all his wise planning of the planting and to Doreen Cant for ordering and collecting all the plants which came from the Skipness nursery. Both worked extremely hard digging and pick axing the ground to get the plants in. Thank you also to all those who turned up at various times and worked just as hard to get the garden where it is today. Thank you Robert Kerr for the tap – that has made life a lot easier during this dry spell! To NAC (in the form of Richard Wright!) for the 40 heathers that were donated by them. We still await confirmation to our letter requesting that NAC cut the grass on a regular basis.

Costs -

- £250 has been spent so far on plants the herbaceous border is still to be planted but it is hoped to get most of these plants from local gardens FOC!
- £60 approx. has been spent on soils & hose pipe.etc.
- Following several requests we have planned a path to a raised seating area at the top end of the garden. This is not on the plan but has been added and with the help of Scott Murdoch should be constructed this week. The approx. cost of this is £70 for materials and £100 labour.
- We have also requested from the NTS 2 log tables and seats which will be sited beside
 the large stones outside the garden we will need to give the NTS garden fund a small
 donation for their work cutting the logs. Eddie O Donnelly has volunteered to transport
 them to Lochranza.

We have enquired about purchasing 80 meters of chicken wire which we will need in the not too distant future when we spot rabbits around! Arran Haulage quoted £75 for this. This brings the amount to slightly over the allowed £500 but it is essential that we protect the plants and we would like permission to order this.

Lastly, it would be a nice thought if the hall committee would consider buying a seat with a plaque in memory of Monica Priestly who has been so generous to the hall for many years. This could be sited on the raised area. This of course would always have to be maintained by the hall committee, however, it is likely that others will copy this idea and donate seats 'in memory' so we suggest that before accepting any others please ensure the upkeep is the donors responsibility!

How were the funds to be raised?

Chairman Bill Scott approached NAC who suggested that we apply for funding from Entrust (Landfill Tax). To qualify the project had to be within 10 miles of the nearest landfill site, the hall was 10.1 miles 'as the crow flies', however, we were granted 10K!

Then the hard work began as you can see from the 2006 report.

Over the years the enthusiasm for working in the garden has dwindled. I am sure no one would wish to see the garden grow to a wilderness again, after all It enhances the hall, lets hope the hall committees in the future don't ever let that happen.
